We hope that you will join us in October, with Dames from across the country, for this year's Biennial to be held at the Omni-Shoreham Hotel, Washington, D.C., Thursday, October 13 through Sunday, October 16, 2022.

A long weekend full of exciting programs has been planned that will provide you the opportunity to socialize and learn more about the important work of the NSCDA and our Corporate Societies: our Dame Impact.

Beginning on Friday, we look forward to three special tours built with Dames in mind. A Tour of Her Own, a Washington, D.C.-based and woman-owned company, will lead us on a preservation-focused walking tour of historic Georgetown. And, on the other side of town, we will walk the hallowed and beautiful halls of the Library of Congress and learn more about our partnership with the Veterans History Project, housed there.

Friday evening, at the opening reception of the conference, Katherine Cammack, our National President, will officially welcome us with an elegant party at the fabulous Hillwood Estate, Museum and Gardens. Attendees and their guests will enjoy exclusive access to the gilded mansion, impeccable grounds, and their new special exhibition *Grace of Monaco: Princess in Dior*.

On Saturday, after a day of meetings, lectures and educational sessions designed to increase our Dame Impact, we will enjoy informal special interest group meet-ups. The evening will start with a cocktail reception, featuring a full open bar and hors d'oeuvres. The reception will be followed by a multi-course black-tie dinner, where we honor the amazing women who have been nominated to this year's Roll of Honor. Our keynote speaker for the evening is the ever-inspiring Lisa Sasaki, Interim Director of the Smithsonian Institution's new National Women's History Museum. She will introduce us to our nation's plans for enshrining women's contributions to our great American story.

Sunday will begin at the Omni-Shoreham with the closing Biennial Council session and will finish with extraordinary tours of the recently restored Arlington House museum. Following our visit to Arlington House, we will conduct a Memorial Service at Arlington National Cemetery, as has been done for 120 years.


Two NSCDA Biennial Sessions Feature DC Society

At the October Biennial, two of the Educational Sessions on the afternoon of Saturday, October 15 will feature the DC Society. Our member Sarah McComas, an experienced non-profit Development professional, will be the lead panelist for a session titled "Securing Your Society's Future." Another session will focus on one of our Society's major funded projects. Lisa Fager, Executive Director of the Mount Zion/ Female Union Band Cemetery, will describe the continuing efforts to establish this Historic Memorial Park. The title of the session will be "Creating Society Impact and Visibility: Cemetery Interpretation and Collaborations." Ms. Fager will be joined by a representation of the Iowa Society in the presentation.

All members of the DC Society are encouraged to register for the weekend Biennial and participate the wide variety of programs that are available, including evening social gatherings. Upcoming Programs: Save the Dates!

Monday, September 12, 2022; 10:30 a.m. - Katharine Uhre Gregorio will speak about her book "The Double Life of Katharine Clark: The Untold Story of the Fearless Journalist Who Risked Her Life for Truth and Justice." Ms. Gregorio, the daughter of DC Dame Lea Uhre, was inspired to write this gripping book when she uncovered a family secret about her great-aunt, Katharine Clark, who worked as a foreign correspondent in Europe during the height of the Cold War, but that was the tip of the iceberg. Ms. Clark's unlikely adventures began in 1955 when she befriended Milovan Djilas, a high-ranking Communist leader in Yugoslavia, who was questioning the ideology he had helped to establish. Their collaboration resulted in Ms. Clark smuggling Mr. Djilas's manifesto out of Yugoslavia and into the hands of American publishers, where it became a New York Times bestseller, was translated into sixty languages, and was used by the CIA in its covert book program.



Wednesday, October 26, 2022; 6:30 p.m. - "Keep it the Home of Washington!" - The Ongoing Restoration of George Washington's Mount Vernon: 2022's Linda Mattingly Memorial Lecture with Adam T. Erby, Curator of Fine and Decorative Arts at Mount Vernon, who will speak about the extensive renovations at the estate that began in 2013. Aided by a restoration campaign grounded in cutting-edge research on the material lives of the Washingtons and their enslaved work force, curators and architectural historians went to work. Mr. Erby will highlight restoration of the Chintz Bedchamber, the Blue Bedchamber, the Yellow Bedchamber, the Central Passage, and the Front Parlor as well as upcoming restoration of the Washington Bedchamber, and the Small Dining Room. He also will discuss continuing and upcoming work on the Greenhouse Slave Quarters and the North Lane, the heart of the enslaved African American community in the 18th Century.







Wednesday, November 16, 2022; 10:30 a.m. - Dr. Keith Lindgren will share his exquisite collection of floral-painted porcelain with an illustrated lecture about "The History of Flower Painting on Porcelain". Dr. Lindgren, husband of DC Dame Janet Lindgren, began collecting this special category of porcelain nearly fifty years ago as he simultaneously pursued a distinguished career as a practicing cardiologist. Dr. Lindgren will discuss the technical challenges of painting on porcelain as it progressed from the invention of porcelain in the first millennium to the discovery of cobalt pigment that was used in the famous Ming blue and white decoration on porcelain to the profusion of flower painting on porcelain in the 18th Century and continues to the present day.

The Historical Activities Committee works with the Mount Zion Memorial Park Foundation to support preservation and education efforts for the historic cemeteries, which are located directly to the east of Dumbarton House and are the final resting place for between 8,000 and 10,000 people, mostly enslaved African Americans, who lived and worked in Washington. An existing building on the property was likely a stop on the Underground Railroad.
