


David O Stewart: George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father Wednesday, February 23, 2022 at 6:30 p.m.



Welcome to 2022 and to our first speaker event of the New Year. David O. Stewart, author of *George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father*, will speak about his book that won the prestigious Society of the Cincinnati History Prize, awarded for "distinguished achievement in advancing the knowledge, understanding, and appreciation of American History." This lecture is in celebration of Washington's Birthday and in recognition of the Colonial Dames' longstanding support for the Washington Family's ancestral homestead, Sulgrave Manor. Mr. Stewart is an accomplished author and noted historian. He asserts that "the Constitutional Convention transformed the Virginian into a 'working politician' whose essentially conservative values led him to desire, as president, a 'respectable' government that could tax and govern without roiling disgruntled citizens." Mr. Stewart's portrait of George Washington embodies an "ambitious, meticulous, petulant, and elitist" individual who became one of America's greatest leaders and

whose reputation has never wavered in the pantheon of history's greatest men. *George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father* will be available for purchase.

Thomas Crocker: *Empires Eagles* Wednesday, March 23, 2022, at 6:30 p.m.



Thomas Crocker will discuss his fascinating book, *Empire's Eagles*, about the neverbefore told story of how Napoleon's top brass escaped to America after Waterloo. Filled with gripping drama and derring-do, *Empire's Eagles* is a colorful, new, and effectively unknown chapter in American history, and we are delighted to host Mr. Crocker, a native Washingtonian and Dumbarton House neighbor, for an illustrated lecture. At the book's center is the mystery of whether Napoleon's "bravest of the brave," Marshal Ney, cheated a firing squad to escape under an alias and reinvent himself in America. At sunset on June 18, 1815, Napoleon Bonaparte was in desperate flight from the battlefield at Waterloo. Racing to reach Paris, he abandoned, on the road, his armored coach and Imperial necessaire containing a fortune in precious gems and cash. Would he stand and fight again or flee to the United States of America? On the run and with his options dwindling by the day, Napoleon came within one hour of secretly slipping to America on a Baltimore

privateer with the active collusion of the United States consul in Bordeaux. *Empire's Eagles* tells the details of this story for the first time ever. *Empire's Eagles* will be available for purchase.

We visit the Maryland State House in the afternoon, ending the day in time to return to DC before the traffic starts.

This is a private day for the Dames prior to the "public-open" day on the 21st for the Maryland Garden Day and Historic Pilgrimage. 

Annual Meeting on May 18 Recognizes Roll of Honor Recipients



The highlight of our DC Society year is the Annual Meeting. This year's date is Wednesday, May 18, and it will be at Dumbarton House. While the exact time has not been decided, the event will be during the day and will be followed by celebratory hospitality. Whether a morning meeting followed by lunch or an afternoon meeting and tea, the emphasis will be on food, fellowship, and fun. The festivities will demonstrate the camaraderie that is a hallmark of the DC Society.

In addition to a brief business meeting, we will shine a spotlight on the ten current members who are listed on the NSCDA Roll of Honor. Established in 1941, when the NSCDA was planning its Fiftieth Anniversary and Golden Jubilee, it was designed to identify worthy individuals whose sustained service, dedicated leadership, and devotion to the ideals of the NSCDA has gone above beyond the ordinary.

In the 81 years that the Roll of Honor has existed, there have been 45 members of the DC Society given this important award. We will honor

our ten current members, and hope they can join us in the Belle Vue Room on May 18. Those ten accomplished women and the year each was selected are as follows: Hannah Cox (1987), Jennie Boyd (1991), Sara Davis (2003), Carolyn Abshire (2006), Betsy Nottingham (2009), Betsy Ruderfer (2009), Louise "Bunny" Muir (2014), Louise Beale (2016), Amy Dewey (2016), Ellen Boomer (2020).

Our first ROH award in 1941, was given posthumously to Mrs. Beverley Kennon, born Brittannia Wellington Peter in 1815. A great-granddaughter of Martha Washington, a lifelong resident of Tudor Place, and. a founder of the NSCDA, Brittannia Peter Kennon was the first president of our DC Society, serving from 1892 until her death in 1911 at age 95.

The Roll of Honor Book is a beautiful, dark-blue, leather volume, exquisitely tooled in gold. The parchment pages are engrossed in black India ink each year with the names of the new honorees. The book is safely kept at Dumbarton House in the Archives because it is too valuable to be handled on a daily basis. During the Biennial Council, it is brought out and displayed in the front hall at Dumbarton House. But, the DC Society has received special permission to display this treasured volume at our Annual Meeting.

Please mark the date of May 18 on your calendar. At the meeting, new Officers, members of the Board of Managers, and Committee Chairs will be introduced. There will be a short summary of the year's activities. As soon as the time of day is determined, we will reach out again. The event is complimentary, but we will request an RSVP for our planning purposes. We hope many members will attend. Please remember that it also is an ideal way to introduce a prospective candidate to the work of our Society in supporting the mission of the NSCDA.

Mount Zion Wreath Sale Success & Volunteer Opportunities

Thank you to all of our members who participated in the wreath sale to benefit the Mount Zion and Female Union Band Society Cemeteries Foundation! Between the pre-sale and the Boutique, the Historical Activities Committee (HAC) sold 100 wreaths, including more than 50 that were sponsored for placement at the cemetery. We raised \$3,000 that we will donate to Mount Zion, and in doing so we will further help to restore and preserve these sacred grounds, as well as educate the public about this historic site. We are deeply grateful to our committee member Debbie Sams Sczudlo for the idea to have and the expertise to accomplish this fundraising and friendraising effort. Not only has the project deepened the DC Dames' relationship with our Dumbarton House neighbors at Mount Zion, but also with other organizations and individuals in the Georgetown community.

More than 60 people attended what was a moving wreath laying and enlightening tour on Saturday, December 11. A large number of DC Dames and their guests, as well as Mount Zion leadership and other local supporters laid wreaths on the headstones as we learned about those buried there. Their stories are rich, fascinating, touching, and representative of so many enslaved and free Black people whose stories were long overlooked and undervalued in American history. Mount Zion continues to work to learn more about the thousands buried there, and thanks to the exemplary research of DC Dames Archivist Judy Stover, we have new information about people enslaved at Dumbarton House who may be buried at Mount Zion. Our committee will continue to collaborate with Mount Zion on their research efforts. Additionally, the HAC and the Young Dames were invited to volunteer at the cemetery last month. We did some weeding, picking up branches from a recent storm, headstone cleaning, and even raised up a previously fallen headstone. There will be more opportunities for such hands-on work this spring. DC Dames and the Military

In honor of Veterans' Day, a morning lecture was held at Dumbarton House on November 10th featuring Marilla Cushman with the Military Women's Memorial. Marilla gave a very interesting talk along with a video detailing how women have made such an impact in service to our country. DC Dames' Archivist, Judy Stover, also spoke about the many ways that our Society has supported active military members and veterans. Below is Judy's historical report, "DC Dames and the Military."

At our November meeting, we had Marilla Cushman, LTC, U.S. Army (Ret.), speak to our DC Dames about women in the military. It was an extremely interesting history of how women had to earn their place in the military to finally have equal rank, pay and duty as men. It was a perfect lecture, held only one day before Veterans' Day.

I spoke at the meeting about the many things the NSCDA and State Societies have done through their Patriotic Service Committees. But for this article, I wanted to know specifically what DC Dames, had done. As our Archivist, I looked into the vaults to see what I could find. The DC archive proved to be a treasure trove of information.

The National and each Society have given generously financially to all our war efforts, as well as supporting their own special projects. What the Dames have done on the National level for our country's military is truly extraordinary. Which raised the question: what have we done?

I wanted to know specially how our DC Dames had directly contributed to the military. The reports of past treasurers and presidents that I researched showed that in addition to giving money, we have provided active support to our military. Our DC Dames honor the military annually by placing a wreath at the Military Women's Memorial on Memorial Day, and also on the Spanish American War Memorial as part of the NSCDA Biennial. During World War I, we helped knits hats, sweaters, and other items by the hundreds. In World War II, we rolled bandages and sent 200,000 items overseas. We held rallies and sold War Bonds. From Korea and Vietnam, to recently in the Middle East, Africa, and Afghanistan, we have supplied items to the wounded in the military hospitals.

Additionally, we continued to make ditty bags filled with a tooth brush and paste, a comb, a razor, and chocolate bars. We made 100 blankets as a Society when we would fringe edges together at Dames meetings, book clubs, and at the Christmas Boutique. We annually donate items for families at Fisher House who are visiting their wounded combatants. We have contributed toys for their children. We have given financially to Wounded Warriors, Canine Companions (support dogs for PTSD victims), Military Women's Memorial (formerly WIMSA), and Fisher House.

The DC Dames recently joined the NSCDA in funding the work of America's VetDogs. We are proud of our past record of support for the military, and we look forward to maintaining our participation in projects supporting both Veterans and active duty military.

In Memory of Nan Hobson

It is with deep regret that we share news of the death of Nan Hobson (Nancy Saussy Hobson - Mrs. James R. Hobson). She was the President of the DC Society from 1999-2002, returning to serve another term in 2008-2009. In 2016, Nan transferred to the NC Society, following a move with her husband, Jim, to Weaverville. We join Nan's family in mourning the loss of this dedicated Dame, who provided such outstanding leadership for the DC Society.



Nancy Hulbert Saussy Hobson died on October 22, 2021. She was born in Savannah, Georgia, on November 22, 1943, to Robert Downie Walker Saussy and Nancy Elizabeth Hulbert Saussy. She was the oldest of four children and the only daughter. She attended Pape School in Savannah, where she made lifelong friends, before moving to Charlotte, North Carolina, in 1960. She attended college for two years and in 1963 married James Richmond Hobson, whom she met when her parents invited him home after church.

After marrying at Christ Church in Savannah, Nan and Jim moved to Washington, D.C., and then to Palo Alto, California, where they raised three girls in a white bungalow with a picket fence, a hedge of roses, and fruit trees in the yard. She became an avid tennis player, learned to cook by watching Julia Child on TV, and commenced throwing ambitious dinner parties. She would eventually train her children to serve as catering staff.

Late in 1972 Nan and Jim packed the girls into a Buick Estate Wagon and took a scenic southern route back East to settle in Alexandria, Virginia. They joined Immanuel Church on the Hill and discovered a trove of wonderful friends, who introduced them to Shrine Mont, the diocesan retreat in the Blue Ridge, which became their favorite vacation spot. Nan became active in the Junior League and the National Society of Colonial Dames, twice serving as the D.C. Society's President. She also served on the Immanuel Church Vestry and became its Senior Warden.

Nan had an abiding love for the South Atlantic coast, especially Tybee Island, Georgia. She returned there often with her children and grandchildren, whom she taught to love the sight of shrimp boats, fiddler crabs, sandpipers, dolphins, and pelicans in formation.

Nan was outgoing and loved people and parties. Finding her in a crowd was easy thanks to her distinctive, raucous laugh, which belied her chic appearance. She had a zany, irreverent streak, and her family remember fondly her harmless transgressions, such as allowing children to play hooky. Among her younger cousins, she held a truly exalted position for her unfailing high spirits, generosity, and smarts.

Nan was a voracious reader who was deeply curious about other people's lives. She loved weighty biographies about her literary and intellectual heroes, among them Jane Austen, Virginia Woolf, William James, and Oscar Wilde. Her children and grandchildren have favorite memories of lying in bed and listening to her turn the pages of a book.

Nan is survived by her husband, Jim, and their daughters Kathleen, Caroline, and Susan, and their husbands Atul, Greg, and Bill; her brothers Downie, Gordon, and Chas; and her grandchildren Walker, Hattie, Hunter, Luca, Lulu, and Robert.

Membership


